- Pete and Graham are both standing 50 metres apart on level ground on No. 1 Oval.
 Pete throws a ball from a height of 1.9 metres which Graham catches two seconds later (without it bouncing), also at a height of 1.9 metres.
 You may assume:
 - I there is no air resistance and the value of g is 10 (ms⁻²).
 - II the equations of motion, are:

where V is the initial velocity, α is the angle of projection, t is the time taken and the origin is at Pete's feet.

 (ii) Find the maximum height of the ball above the ground.
 (iii) Pete throws another ball with the same initial velocity and from the same starting height (1.9 metres above the level ground), but he wants to maximise the distance he throws horizontally. How far away should Graham now stand in order to catch this second throw (without bouncing and at a height of 1.9 metres)?
- (b) A series of lines are drawn on a Cartesian diagram such that y = nx, where *n* can be one of 0, 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, 8, 9. Triangles are formed using two of the above lines and the line x = 1.
